History of Rotary International

Paul Harris, a Chicago attorney formed the Rotary Club of Chicago on February 23, 1905, so professionals with diverse backgrounds could exchange ideas, form meaningful, lifelong friendships, and give back to their communities.

Rotary's name came from the group's early practice of rotating meetings among the offices of its members.

Organization of Rotary



- Rotary International is headquartered in Evanston, Illinois
 - Over 46,000 clubs worldwide.
- The President of RI, can be from anywhere in the world
- The Organization of Rotary International is divided into:
 - Zones – Our district is part of RI Zone 29
 - Districts – Our District is 5610 and includes all of South Dakota, northwestern Iowa, northeast Nebraska and southwestern Minnesota
 - D5610 Clubs – There are currently 35 active clubs and 4 Rotaract clubs

Object of Rotary

The Object of Rotary is to encourage and foster the ideal of service as a basis of worthy enterprise and, in particular, to encourage and foster:

FIRST: The development of acquaintance as an opportunity for service;

SECOND: High ethical standards in business and professions; the recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations; and the dignifying of each Rotarian's occupation as an opportunity to serve society;

THIRD: The application of the ideal of service in each Rotarian's personal, business, and community life;

FOURTH: The advancement of international understanding, goodwill, and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional persons united in the ideal of service.

We channel our commitment to service at home and abroad through five Avenues of Service, which are the foundation of club activity.

- Club Service focuses on making clubs strong. A thriving club is anchored by strong relationships and an active membership development plan.

5. Help maintain a harassment-free environment in Rotary meetings, events, and activities; report any suspected harassment; and help ensure non-retaliation to those individuals that report harassment
